## Walking Tour of Historic Lee

CHURCH PARK: In the very center of town, the park features a marble drinking fountain designed by the famous sculptor Daniel Chester French. The fountain, dedicated in 1899, is a memorial to Miss Kilbon, a member of the Loyal Temperance Legion; the design includes a bas relief of Chief Konkapot, tribal leader of the Stockbridge Mohican Indians. There is also a monument to the first ancient campsite of the area's Native Americans supplied by the DAR. The park includes a time capsule to be opened in the year 2077, and the Lee Chamber of Commerce Visitor Information Center.

FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH: The 195-foot tall steeple is the tallest timber-frame steeple in New England. The cornerstone for the building was laid in 1857 and has a 141-year-old clock system built by Turret and Marine Clock Co. of Boston and a Seth Thomas Clock Movement to drive the four dials that strike the bell. The clock is hand-wound and is designed to run for seven days. The church is a fine example of Romanesque architecture. The interior was decorated by German artists using a technique called trompe l'oeil [fool the eye]. It is regarded as one of the finest examples of this work in the United States. The church is on the National Register of Historic Places.

MEMORIAL HALL: The Town of Lee erected this hall in honor of her 38 sons who died of wounds or disease in the Civil War. Their names are listed on three tablets inside the building. Included are three names representing the 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry, Company A. These honored soldiers were members of the famed 54th Massachusetts Regiment, Afro-American soldiers who proved their valor in the attack on Battery Wagner, SC in 1863, as depicted in the film Glory.

Memorial Hall also houses town offices and the Lee Police Station. At the rear of Memorial Hall young Arlo Guthrie was put on trial for littering in 1965, "Blind Justice" James Hannon's law offices are still at 184 Main Street. Other Guthrie sites are in Stockbridge and Great Barrington, These events are memorialized in the song and movie Alice's Restaurant.

#### Main Street Architecture

40-52 Main - BAIRD and BENTON BLOCK: Built in 1879; high Victorian Italianate style.

54-56 Main - PHELAN BLOCK: Built in 1912 of Lee marble; Victorian. The interior was furnished with maple floors and pressed tin cellings; reiling beams are cast from.

60 Main - OMAN BLOCK: Built in 1879 the front is faced with Lee marble: Victorian Commercial style.

62-66 Main - MOREY BLOCK: Built in 1879 of brick after fire deatroyed the original wood frame building.

68-78 Main - BAIRD BLOCK: Built in 1857; Remaissance Revival; home of Lee's newspaper, THE VALLEY GLEANER, until the paper finally ceased publication in the 1940s.

St. GEORGE'S CHURCH/SPECTRUM PLAYHOUSE: The Episcopal Society was formed in Lee in 1856 and its first wood frame church was built in 1858. The wood frame church burned to the ground on December 24, 1861. It was rebuilt, in 1865, of Lee marble. In February 1879, a great fire destroyed much of the business district adjacent to the church. The church roof and some of the contents were lost, but the stone withstood the fire and the roof was rebuilt. The architectural style is Gothic Revival. Today the Spectum Playhouse occupies this space, it is a performing arts center offering programs for both children and adults.

LEE LIBRARY: Built in 1907 using Lee marble in the Beaux-arts style, paid for with a generous Andrew Carnegie grant and local funds. Marble from the Lee Quarry was also used in constructing the 1977 addition. The library sits on the site of Peter Wilcox's log cabin, the first downtown building. The first town meeting was held here in 1777. Veterans Park fronts the building with plaques henoring James M. Burt, winner of the Congressional Medal of Honor in World War II.

ST. MARY'S CHURCH: This Roman Catholic Church was built in 1856. The corneratone was laid on September 21, 1856 by Father Cuddihy, Father Cuddihy celebrated the first Mass on Sunday, March 15, 1657 in the unfinished church. A picket fence was built to enclose the property. In 1873, the fence was removed and a marble stone wall and ornamental fence were erected to enclosed the property. A 1235 pound bell was purchased and installed in 1914.

Witch" purchased in 1856. The "Water Witch" was housed on Academy Street and the second floor of the building was used for meetings. In 1859, the flown voted to establish a Fire District. The fire house was moved to School Street in 1888. At a meeting of the Lee Fire District in 1911, it was voted to purchase this property on Main Street. The Building was to be of Lee marble designed by Henry S. Mout. It was completed in 1912. A hell, purchased by Lee citizens for the old fire station on School Street, was moved to the tower of this building. In 1939, while on parade in a national competition at New York World's Fair, the department received an award for the best appearing Fire Company.

st. MARY'S PAROCHIAL SCHOOL/CHAMBERY INN: The Chambery innotes the original St. Mary's School building, built in 1885. Five nuns from the Order of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Chambery (France) came to staff the school. It was the first parochial school in Berkshire County and marked the Order's first endeavor in the United States. The building was purchased by the Toole family for \$1 in 1989 to save it from demolition, and on May 23, 1989 the building was moved from Academy Street to its present location.

JOE'S DINER: A small local eatery that may have been the inspiration for the setting of Norman Rockwell's painting "The Runaway." Photos of visiting politicians, performers and athletes dating back to the 1950s line the walls. "Good Morning America" with Diane Sawyer, Robin Roberts and Chris Cuomo broadcast from here in 2008.

EAGLE MILL: At the north end of downtown, the Eagle Mill served as a paper producer for about 200 years. Current plans are to redevelop the mill as housing and commercial space.

LEE RAILROAD STATION/SULLIVAN STATION: The station was built in 1893 by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad. Prior to the construction of the passenger depot, passengers boarded and disembarked from a wooden building located across the tracks from the present building. At the turn of the 20th century crowds of curious onlookers often gathered here to watch exotic wildlife unloaded from cars onto wagons for the trip up-October Mountain to William C. Whitney's wildlife preserve.

DRESSER HULL: The original Dresser store was built on this street in 1883. In 1904, two leading coal and grain concerns of Lee, the David Dresser store, mill and yard and the business possessions of the Hull Coal and Grain-Co formed a new corporation called Dresser Hull Company: Eventually, the company expanded into the lumber and building supply business.

\$1-59 Main - NORTHUP BLOCK: Built in 1857; Federal style, A fourth floor with a mansard roof was added in 1879; destroyed by fire in the 1920s.

47 Main - LEE NATIONAL BANK/GREYLOCK FEDERAL CREDIT UNION:
The Lee National Bank was incorporated in 1835 and this building was built
the same year. Lee Savings Bank shared quarters with the Lee National until
1904 when an act of the legislature officially separated national and savings
banks. The architecture is a Greek revival brick building altered to Italianate
style in 1858. The interior of the building was remodeled in 1998 to its
original 19th century design. The building now houses the Greylock Federal
Credit Union. [Not to be missed]

43 Main - PEASE BLOCK: Occupied in 1864 until the late 1940s by Pease's Drugstore: Greek revival with a recessed Greek temple front.

## Walking Tour Continued

THE MORGAN HOUSE: Built in 1817, The Morgan House was a private residence for Esquire William Porter and his family. Edwin Morgan, the first settler of the city of Springfield, purchased and enlarged the home in 1853 and opened its doors to visitors arriving on incoming stagecoaches. Mr. Morgan served as a stone cutter and was commissioned by his firm to look for atone to build the west wing of the Capital in Washington, D.C. He recognized the beauty of Lee marble and induced his firm to use if in the addition to the Capital building. As early as 1861, many traveling theater groups stayed here. Other famula guests were Ulysses S. Grant, Ted Shawn and George Bernard Shaw. In the 1970s, the Morgan House was owned by Maria Cole, wife of Nat King Cole. The present owners maintain it as an inn, layern and restaurant. The architecture of the building is of the Federal style.

15-19 Main - PARK BUILDING: Built in 1914, this building is another fine example of the use of Lee marble. It is designed in the style of Boxton architect Louis Henry Sullivan and has what was then a "modern" look typical of his style. He personally designed and built high rise "akyscrapers" that were about eight levels high.

wellington smith house, kelly puneral home: The building style of architecture used here is Second Empire French mansard. There is a full veranda in the Italianate style. The house was built in 1830 and had different owners until 1857 when it was purchased by John R. Smith; Wellington Smith was his son. In 1864, his uncle Elizur Smith, took Wellington and his cousin Dewitt into business creating the Smith Paper Co. This company became the first in America to commercially produce paper from wood pulp using the Berkshires' poplar trees for raw material. Wellington was the first president of the American Paper and Pulp Association. In 1872 Wellington remodeled the house. This was the first house in Lee to be supplied with water from a reservoir and the first with indoor bathrooms.

#### WITHIN DRIVING DISTANCE

#### Monument to a Cow:

Take West Park Street, near Church Park, to Fairview Street (across from the golf course). Drive along Fairview Street until you reach the 700 numbers. The marble monument will be on your left-hand side just before Davis Street. The monument is on property that was once the Highfield Farm owned by John G. Ellis.

The cow, Highfield Colantha Mooie, in her 18 years, produced 205,928.5 pounds of milk. Colantha was born, lived and died on that farm. (1919-1937)

Lee, Massachusetts - The southern half of Berkshire County was purchased from the Stockbridge Indians for 460 pounds sterling, three barrels of cider and 30 quarts of rum. From this purchase 14,237 acres became the Town of Lee. Lee was incorporated on October 21, 1777 - becoming the 21st town in Berkshire County.

The town is named after Revolutionary War era Major General Charles Lee, a rank that placed him second in command to Gen. Washington. Lee also served earlier in the British Army during the Seven Years War. After that war he sold his commission and served for a time in the Polish army of King Stanislaus II. Lee was court martialed after leading the disastrous Battle of Monmouth against British forces in 1778. Charles Lee was born in Cheshire, England and died in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania (1732-1782).

#### INDUSTRY

PAPER

Paper making has been an important industry in Lee since 1806 when Samuel Church built the first paper mill in South Lee. The Housatonic River provided ample water power. In the 1920s Church's mill was sold to Owen and Hurlbut who converted it into a factory that produced fine writing paper. The first paper produced from ground wood pulp was made in Lee at the Smith Paper Company.

MARBLE

In 1852, Mr. Charles Heebner came to Lee from Philadelphia and opened the Heebner Marble Quarry. Tests had proven that Lee marble could withstand a much greater pressure than any other in the country and was more durable than Italian marble. Lee marble has been used throughout the world; it was used to build the Customs House Annex in Boston, the base of the Washington Monument in Washington, DC and for thousands of headstones at Arlington National Cemetery. In addition, thousands of tons have been shipped to grave sites around the United States and abroad for American graves on foreign soil.

You will see the many uses of Lee marble as you take this walking tour. Lee lime is also sold throughout the world.
